About Competitive Examinations

Examinations are conducted to evaluate a person of his knowledge or ability. There are different types of examinations like qualifying or competitive exams. Qualifying exams are conducted to evaluate certain kind of knowledge or skills; they are decided as per the course. After completing a particular course or during the course these exams are conducted. Here the number of students is limited. Competitive exams are conducted either to qualify a candidate for a particular course or to give entry into the institution.

Competitive exams are also conducted for selecting a person for a job. Clearing a Competitive exam will help a person to enter into his Dream College or institution or to pursue his dream job. This section will help students to get some vital information about those exams. Some of the major institutions of government conduct these examinations. To clear these exams dedicated efforts along with certain soft skills are required. One should have clear knowledge of one's goals, and he should know how to use time effectively for getting success in competitive exams.

Union Public Service Commission

The first Public Service Commission was set up on 1st Oct 1926 for the recruitment into its territory. After independence the need was felt to set up an independent organization for the Recruitment into the Government services.

On 26th Jan 1950 the federal Public Service Commission was given a constitutional status as an autonomous entity and given the title –Union Public Service Commission. This has been established under the article 315 of the constitution of India. Its main duties are recruitment to services and posts under the Union and the Central government through conduct of competitive examinations and interviews.

Civil Services Examination

Under the constitution one of the functions of the Commission is to conduct examinations for appointment to Civil Services/Posts of the Union. It conducts their examinations spread over 42 regular centers throughout the country. The Civil Services examination is a single and combined examination for recruitment to Indian Administrative Services (IAS), Indian Police Service IPS), Indian Foreign Service (IFS) and the other higher Central Services (i.e. group A and group B).

UPSC- Civil Service Examination and Syllabi

Plan for the examination

Government of India as an employer

The Government of India is the biggest and the most important employer in the country. Barring a few lower categories of jobs, the other middle and high-level positions under the Central Government are filled by recruitment through an independent agency called the Union Public Service Commission (UPSC). The Constitution of India advises the Commission to select qualified people to fill these positions. This part deals with the recruitment done by the Commission annually through the Civil Service Examinations.

According to the current plan, the Civil Service Examination consists of two successive levels.

- Civil Service Examination Preliminary (Objective type) for the selection of candidates for the Main Examination
- Civil Service Main Examination (descriptive type and Interview) for the selection of candidates for various services and posts.

Applications are first invited for the Preliminary Examination only. Candidates who are declared by the Commission to have qualified for admission to the main Examination will have to apply again in the detailed application form which will be supplied to them.

Advertisement inviting applications for the preliminary examination is usually published in all leading newspapers during May. The time lag between the advertisement date and the last date for submitting the application usually is about four weeks. The number of vacancies to be filled based on the results of the Civil Service Examinations is also indicated in the advertisement. The preliminary examination is usually held in August and the main examination in December.

ELIGIBILITY CONDITIONS

A. NATIONALITY

Must be a citizen of Indian for the Indian Administrative Service and the Indian Police Service. For other Services, he must either be:

- a) A Citizen of India or
- b) A Subject of Nepal or
- c) A Subject of Bhutan or
- d) A Tibetan refugee who came over to India before the 1st January 1962 with the intention of permanently settling in India or
- e) A person of Indian origin who has migrated from Pakistan, Burma, Sri Lanka, East Countries of Kenya, Uganda, the United Republic of Tanzania, Zambia, Malawi, Zaire and Ethiopia and Vietnam with the intention of permanently settling in India.

A candidate belonging to the letter category (b, c, d, or e) shall be a person in whose favor a certificate of eligibility has been issued by the Government of India.

B. AGE LIMIT

The candidate must have attained the age of 21 years and must not have attained the age of 32 years as of 1st August of the year of the Civil Service Examinations. The upper age limit prescribed above will be relatable.

- Up to a maximum of five years, if a candidate belongs to a Scheduled Caste or a Scheduled Tribe or Ex-Servicemen, ECO/SSCO.
- Up to a maximum of three years, if a candidate belongs to "Other Backward Classes" or disabled Defense Services Personnel.

C. EDUCATIONAL QUALIFICATIONS

Minimum educational requirement is a University degree or its equivalent qualification.

NOTE:

- Candidates who have appeared for Civil Service Examination the passing of which would render them educationally qualified for the Commission's examinations but have not been informed of the results as also the candidates who intend to appear at such a qualifying examination will also be eligible for admission to the Preliminary Examination.
- All candidates who are declared qualified by the Commission for taking the Civil Services (Main) Examination will be required to produce proof of passing the requisite Civil Service Examination with the application for the Main Examination, failing which such candidates will not be admitted to the Main Examination

PERMISSIBLE NUMBER OF ATTEMPTS

In all, six attempts are permitted, and in the case of physically disabled persons of the general category, nine attempts are permitted if they are otherwise eligible. Appearance at the Preliminary Examination itself will be reckoned as an attempt. Appearing for one paper in the Civil Service Examination will also be counted as an attempt.

This restriction on the number of attempts will not apply in the case of scheduled caste and scheduled tribe candidates.

The number of attempts permissible to candidates belonging to "other backward classes" is nine.

PLAN OF EXAMINATION

The Civil Service Examination comprises two successive stages:

- Civil Service (Preliminary) Examination (Objective Type) for the selection of candidates for Main Examination.
- Civil Service (Main) Examination (written and Interview) for the selection of candidates for the various services and posts.
- The preliminary examination shall comprise two compulsory papers of 200 Marks each.
- Both the question papers will be of the objective type (Multiple choice questions)
- The general studies Paper-II if the Civil service (Preliminary) Examination will be a qualifying paper with minimum qualifying marks fixed at 33%.

NOTE:

- The Commission will draw a list of candidates to be qualified for Civil Service (Main) Examination based on the total qualifying marks as may be determined by the Commission, of the two papers put together.
- The question papers will be set both in Hindi and English. However, questions relating to English Language Comprehension skills of class X level will be tested through passages from English language only without providing Hindi translation thereof in the question paper.
- Details of the syllabi are indicated in Part-A of Section III.
- Each paper will be of two hours duration. Blind candidates will, however, be allowed and extra time of twenty minutes for each paper.

NOTE:

- The papers on Indian Languages and English (Paper-A and Paper-B) will be of Matriculation or equivalent standard and will be of qualifying nature. The marks obtained in these papers will not be counted for ranking.
- Evaluation of the papers, namely, Essay, General Studies and Optional Subject of all the candidates would be done simultaneously along with an evaluation of their qualifying papers on 'Indian Languages' and 'English' but the papers on Essay General Studies and Optional Subject of only such minimum standard as may be fixed by commission at their discretion for the qualifying papers on Indian Language and English.
- The paper-A on Indian Language will not, however, be compulsory for candidates hailing from the states of Arunachal Pradesh, Manipur, Meghalaya, Mizoram, Nagaland, and Sikkim.
- Marks obtained by the candidates for Paper I-VII only will be counted for merit ranking.
 However, the commission will have the discretion to fix qualifying marks in any or all of these papers.

NOTE: For Santali language, question paper will be printed in Devanagari script; but candidates will be free to answer either in Devanagari script or in Olchiki.

Interview for personality test:

Candidates who obtain such minimum qualifying marks in the written part of the Civil Services Competitive Examinations as may be fixed by the Commission at their discretion are summoned by them for an Interview for a Personality Test. The candidates will be interviewed by a Board who will have before them a record of his career. The candidate will be asked questions on matters of general interest. The object of the interview is to assess the personal suitability of the candidate for a career in public service by a board of competent and unbiased observers. The test intended to judge the mental caliber of a candidate. In broad terms, this is

really an assessment of not only his intellectual qualities but also social traits and his interest in current affairs. Some of the qualities to be judged are mental alertness, critical powers of assimilation, clear and logical exposition, balance of judgment, variety and depth of interest and moral integrity.

The technique of the interview is not that of a strict cross-examination but of a natural, direct and purposive conversation which is intended to reveal the mental qualities of the candidate. The interview is not intended to be a test either of the specialized of general Knowledge of the candidates which has been already tested through their written papers. Candidates are expected to have taken an intelligent interest not only in their special subjects of academic study but also in the events which are happening around them both within and outside their own state or country as well as in modern currents of thought and in new discoveries which should rouse the curiosity of well-educated youth.

Marks thus obtained by the candidates in the Main Examination (written part as well as P.T.) will determine their final ranking. Candidates will be allotted to the various services keeping in view their ranks in the Civil Services Competitive Examinations and the preferences expressed by them for various Services and Posts.

Karnataka Administrative Service Examination and Their Syllabi

CLASSIFICATION OF POSTS AND MODE OF RECRUITMENT:

Depending upon the nature of duties and responsibilities, the posts in the State Government Service are classified into groups A, B, C and D. For technical posts falling in groups A, B and C like Doctors, Scientists, and Engineers, the KPSC normally issues advertisements inviting applications from eligible candidates. A Combined Competitive examination to one or more of the services of groups of posts mentioned in schedule I shall be held subject to availability of vacancies, in the manner set out in Schedule II.

There shall be reservation of vacancies for candidates belonging to scheduled castes, scheduled tribes and other backward classes to the extent provided for by the Government.

The KPSC shall prepare separate lists of names of the candidates, equal to have a number of vacancies, considered suitable for an appointment for each of the said services in Group- A and Group-B arranged in the order of merit determined on the basis of total marks secured in the main examination comprising written examination and personality test.

SCHEME OF EXAMINATION

SECTION -I PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION

The competitive examination shall comprise two stages:-

- Preliminary Examination (Objective type) for the selection of candidates for the main examination.
- Main Examination (written examination and Personality Test) for selection for candidates for various services and posts.

Under Section I, for the sub-heading "A Preliminary Examination" and the entries relating thereto, the following shall be substituted, namely,

Preliminary Examination: The Preliminary Examination shall consist of two papers of Objective type (multiple choice)

- Each paper carrying 100 questions with each question carrying two marks.
- Each paper shall be of a maximum of 200 marks and a duration of two hours

(Total for two papers 400 Marks) in the following description, namely:-

Note: -

- The question paper shall be both in Kannada and English.
- The standard of General Mental Ability questions of preliminary examination (aptitude Test) shall be that of X / SSLC level and the remaining papers are that of Degree Level.
- The number of candidates to be admitted to the main examination shall be 20 times the vacancies notified for recruitment in the order of merit on the basis of the performance in the preliminary examination, subject to accommodating the same ratio in adequate number of candidates belonging to the categories of Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes, each of the Backward Classes and others.
- There shall be negative marking for incorrect answers (as detailed below) for all questions except some of the questions where the negative marking shall be inbuilt in the

form of different marks being awarded to the most appropriate and not so appropriate

answer for such questions.

• There are four alternative answers to every question. For each question, of which a wrong

answer has been given by the candidate, one fourth (0.25) of the marks assigned to that

question shall be deducted as penalty.

• If a candidate gives more than one answer to a question, it shall be treated as a wrong

answer even if one of the given answers happen to be correct and there shall be same

penalty in accordance with clause(I).

If a question is left blank i.e. no answers is given by the candidate, there shall be no

penalty for that question.

How to score 125+ in Prelims?

- The cut-off for UPSC Prelims is usually around 110-120 marks for General Category in GS 1. With proper preparation and practice tests, it is quite possible to clear the Prelims in the very first attempt itself. Integrate Current Affairs preparation and revision into your daily plan. Try to minimize the sources as too much information will simply cause more confusion.
- Read the NCERT books as they will give the basic concepts. Other than NCERT books, the essential books for Prelims are Indian Polity by Laxmikanth, Indian Economy by Ramesh Singh.
- Practice reducing incorrect answers as there is negative marking in UPSC Prelims. Either, the candidates attempt very few questions as they are afraid of negative marking or they carelessly attempt questions without knowing the answers. Give Prelims Test series or join IAS coaching if you feel you need it. The basic idea is to revise, make mistakes, revise better and finally make fewer mistakes in the actual Prelims exam
- Along with books mentioned in booklist, get a printout of the syllabus and read it carefully.
- And when you start, it is recommended that you begin with NCERT books. Read and
 revise them methodically to gain absolute conceptual clarity. They form the foundation of
 your knowledge which will help you immensely through all stages of the exam.
- Do not be scared at the long list of books. For a beginner, one year is more than enough to cover the complete syllabus of GS (prelims and mains) and optional.
- In the book list, wherever it is mentioned selective reading, it means there's no need to read the book cover to cover. Go through the past five years' question papers to understand the kind of questions UPSC usually asks. It'll give you a good perspective of what's important and what's not.
- For the same topic, do not refer to more than one material. For example, take India's freedom struggle (1857-1947). If you read that portion from the Spectrum publications, there's no need to do the same again from Bipan Chandra's book. Read the latter to cover those parts not covered in the former.

- Use internet extensively. Eg: YouTube's PMFIAS channel is an excellent resource for understanding complex Geography topics. Similarly, for Art & Culture, watch videos of classical dances, folk dances, puppetry shows on YouTube so that you could memorize their features better. In Science & Tech, if you come across a term, say, Block chain Technology, go to YouTube and see explainer videos. Even for Environment, suppose you read about endangered species such as the Red Panda and Malabar Hornbill, Google them and see how they look. Visuals stick in your mind far longer. Your target must be to gain knowledge, be it through books or through internet.
- If you are taking coaching, by all means read their notes. But please keep in mind that you cannot just read those coaching notes and neglect these standard books. For example, take Polity topic. A coaching institute's notes will never cover the complete subject, only Laxmikanth does. So even if you refer to your coaching notes, you still have to read Laxmikanth and know it like the back of your hand. This principle applies for all subjects.
- For all subjects, you have to superimpose current affairs over it. To illustrate, in Polity topic, apart from reading the static theory portion, you need to keep an eye on current happenings. For example, if the Government brings in Constitutional amendment for GST, you must read both about the major provisions of the amendment and the Constitutional amendment procedure itself. Do this for all subjects.
- To perform well in Prelims, revision is crucial. Without it, you will not be able to recollect whatever you may have read. So please dedicate adequate time for revision before the actual exam.
- To succeed in this exam, the source of material is not important. What's important is you to understand the concepts, memorize the facts well and have a firm grip over the entire syllabus.

Training Program

All Indian Services Mains & Preliminary Examination Training

Two papers of Preliminary Examination which consist of objective type multiple choice questions. Certain basic skills required to understand, analyze and select the best answers to different types of questions are taught. Emphasis is on exercises and acquisition skills to crack questions of logical, numerical and analytical types quickly. General knowledge component is also extensively covered along with current affairs.

Along with this enough emphasis will be give on language papers and five compulsory papers, essay paper, four general knowledge papers and two papers in one of the optional subjects. At present, Training Programme imparts training in six optional subjects. These are Geography, Public Administration, History, Sociology, Economics, and Kannada Literature.

Training for Karnataka Civil Service

The next part of the training is exclusively for candidates appearing for the Karnataka Civil Service Examinations. Since syllabus for these examinations are nearly identical to All India Service Examination, teaching pattern, duration, and content of training are also the same as for the All India Services.
